The VOICE has a copy of the service schedule for the Fall Jewish Holidays, and it is also on our website and available on our Facebook page. For Rosh Hashanah it's pretty easy:

Evening (Monday night): 6:00 pm

Morning (both Tuesday and Wednesday): 9:30am

As regards the morning services, we have listened to you once again about keeping our services within reduced periods and we try to avoid wholesale repetition between the two days. On Day 1, we will begin with the Torah Service (with its reading about the Egyptian handmaiden being expelled into the desert), move to the Shofar service, Rabbi's sermon, and traditional Mussaf. On Day 2, we will begin with Shacharit, and continue with the Torah Service (with its reading about the Akeidah), Torah Study (and there is a handout for Torah study that you will need for those who attend on ZOOM), Shofar Service, and selections from the Mussaf service that were not part of the first day. Cantor Amy will be leading the service with her sweet voice, and I will help give you informational and spiritual guidance along the way.

However, in order to meet this plan, we had to move up various prayers to the front of part of the service that require a minyan. **So, in trying to limit the morning service to approximately 2.5 hours, you would be helping us move along without interruption by being able to join us at or near the opening bell. A Message from your Shabbat Gabbi

This week in our triennial cycle we continue reading from the fifth book of the Torah, the Book of Deuteronomy, Parshah Vayelech, "And Moses went". The parshah recounts the events of Moses' last day of life. "I am one hundred and twenty years old" he says to the people and He transfers the leadership to Josuha. Moses concludes writing the Torah in a scroll which he entrusts to the Levites for safekeeping in the Ark of the Covenant. Moses gives the commandment of assembly, where every seven years, during the holiday of Sukkot, all men, women, and children assemble at the Temple in Jerusalem and the King publicly reads sections of the Torah. Moses commanded the Israelites to gather following every Sabbatical year and informed them of the suffering which will be their lot when they will abandon the laws of the Torah. For those with access to a copy of the Etz Hayim (or any other volume that contains the Five Books of Moses), the triennial reading can be found starting at Chapter 31 on verse 1 on Page 1173 of the Etz Hayim. The weekly reading concludes on page 1179 at the end of Chapter 31.
